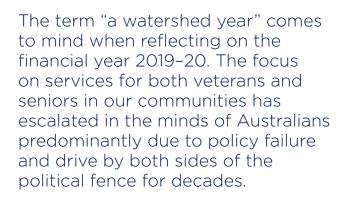

# Chairman & CEO report

# Moving forward together



The Air Force Association of Australia (AFA), has been highlighting this lack of response to the needs of the veteran community and despite advocacy undertaken by those in ex-service organisations, the need for change has fallen on deaf ears, until recently.

The members of Division Council's across each State in Australia in combination with the National Board have responded to a number of government inspired inquiries into the state of support for veterans. The productivity report "A Better Way to Support Veterans", had a major focus on the performance of the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) and their response to supporting veterans needs. Reforms are now underway to change the cultural perspective of DVA across Australia with the major focus on improving access to mental health services, especially to minimise the risk of self-harm.



The AFA National Board has created a Joint Board Steering Group (JBSG) with the primary purpose of redefining and harmonising governance and membership structures across all Divisions. One JBSG initiative showing positive outcomes with increasing engagement with Air Force senior officers and personnel is the work undertaken by all Divisions to identify better ways to engage with younger veterans, current serving personnel and their families. The recent acceptance of Chief of Air Force, Air Marshal Mel Hupfeld, AO DSC, to be the patron for the Association is another indicator of the growing reconnection between the Association and the Air Force family across Australia.

The creation of an executive role to drive the purpose and engagement with veterans and defence under the banner of Clear Skies has seen significant growth in connection and engagement with Air Force heritage and the current serving personnel at Pearce Air Base.

Several significant projects are being planned which engage the branches within Western Australia. This has seen a regeneration of the focus on the original purpose of the organisation established 90 years ago in this State in 1929. The acknowledgement and celebration this year of the 100th anniversary of the Air Force Association across Australia reflects our continued commitment and role as an ex-service organisation.

The second most significant watershed moment has been the awakening of the Australian community to the important role that aged care providers and their staff have in ensuring quality care for vulnerable seniors across this nation. The operation of the "Seniors Living" portfolio under the banner of RAAFA, has been impacted by the erosion of funding structures that are required to support the provision of care within a residential care facility. At the time of writing, the sector was showing 63% of aged care facilities across Australia reporting a negative profit, with over 25% reporting negative cash flows.

Continual advocacy of peak bodies representing our sector over many years has seen continual frustration primarily due to political parties that don't believe that aged care to date has been an issue that impacts on the decision making of most Australians at the polls. The mood and focus of many voting Australians is changing due to a number of significant events over this year.

The interim report of the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety titled "Neglect" has focused on the Commonwealth Government response to an ageing community with very clear reference to the inadequacy of funding and lack of support for seniors. This has now risen to new levels of coverage within the media and engagement with the Australian community.

The changes in legislation from 1 July 2019 and increased powers of the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission has highlighted how many providers are struggling in their ability to meet the standards expected with the limited funding structures and staffing requirements.

The COVID-19 pandemic has hailed an increased understanding across both government and community of the significant role that aged care providers across Australia have in supporting seniors, sadly against a backdrop of many deaths within care facilities in the Eastern States. The awakening of many at all levels of government that facilities are not miniature hospitals and that they do not have the capacity to respond to these pandemics was in many cases, too late.

RAAFA has an amazing team of people who have worked diligently to develop COVID-19 response, train staff and to ensure that we have the PPE resources required to support the residents, family and staff in the event of an outbreak.

So, as we reflect on this watershed year, we would like you to recognise and acknowledge the amazing work that has been done to ensure the quality and safety of all those living in our aged care facilities and large retirement villages.

The effort put in by all our staff, whilst still ensuring and achieving compliance standards with ever reducing resources, against a backdrop of COVID-19 preparation is to be commended. Teams continue to support each other through COVID-19 with a positive culture, maintaining a focus on the purpose of the Association, supporting the community, veterans and service personnel, reflecting the rich history and purpose of our association and its hundred year history in Australia.

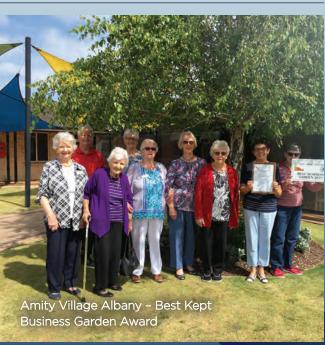

# Master Planning - Air Force Memorial Estate (AFME) Bull Creek

The future looks bright for our oldest estate

Our aim is to:

- Create a new heart at the centre of the site where residents can belong and choose how to pursue their daily lives
- Improve the memorial gateway to the Estate
- Connect with nature, open space and landscape by enhancing and creating greater connection to Lake Howard and the central park land and take advantage of city views
- Provide places for gathering, privacy and retreat through more formal and informal social spaces
- Be highly accessible and inclusive with clear connections to key destinations and a great people-focussed street environment

Our vision for the AFME is to create an inclusive, safe and connected community that enables people to continue to live healthy, purposeful lives through responsive facilities and services, meaningful relationships, ongoing learning and a choice of activities.

Planning for the next phase of development is well progressed following the very recent completion of Cirrus Apartments, a 57 apartment building and new RAAFA Club.

#### **RAAFA Club**

The RAAFA Club at the Air Force Memorial Estate (AFME) in Bull Creek is an important place for the residents at AFME and members of RAAFA. The original Club was built in 1972 and was demolished in 2018 to make way for the development of a new Club and our Cirrus Apartment development.

The Club provides an opportunity for reflection and renewal with respect to the operation, services, look and feel, in a way that builds upon the special parts of the original and temporary facilities. This is important because the Club is part of the fabric of RAAFA and of the Estate.

Resulting from many conversations and considerable consultation, the Vision and Principles were developed to guide the planning and commissioning of the new Club, opening in October 2020.

# Public artwork

Honouring the past, being in the present and embracing the future



Created by renowned WA artist Anne Neil the artwork offers a welcoming feature to residents and visitors to the RAAFA Club and Cirrus Apartments.

Based on the theme of hobbies and modelmaking, the artworks have a sense of fun and playfulness, with use of the parts and shapes of a Hawker Hurricane model making kit as inspiration.

"It has been a real thrill to be working on this project, and in fact it has been quite personal for me as my father was a radio operator and flew for RAAF in WWII," said Anne.

"He was a very private man and although we knew a little bit about what he went through, this project has enabled me to connect with him in many ways, even though he passed away several years ago.

I've met a number of museum volunteers as a result of this project, many of whom were my dad's age, and I have been able to sit in some of the planes my father flew in and understand a little more about some of the experiences he would have had during the war years."

Anne explains that she was spoilt for choice in terms of inspiration for the project, with the time she spent at the museum also bringing back wonderful childhood memories.

"I purchased a few model aeroplane kits when I was first working on the project, and managed to track down a balsa wood kit.

"I found the small parts intriguing and beautiful with their stamped part numbers and recesses, and this inspired me to create new sculptures from replicas of the kit pieces.

"Like the sculptures, the external precast concrete wall artwork is abstract and extends the original concept story with the low relief pattern inspired by the spaces left in the balsa wood sheets when the shapes are pushed out. This design is also reflected inside the Club.

"From all of the aeroplane kits available, I chose the Hawker Hurricane model, as this plane was pivotal to the success of the Battle of Britain but was largely unrecognised for its contributions."

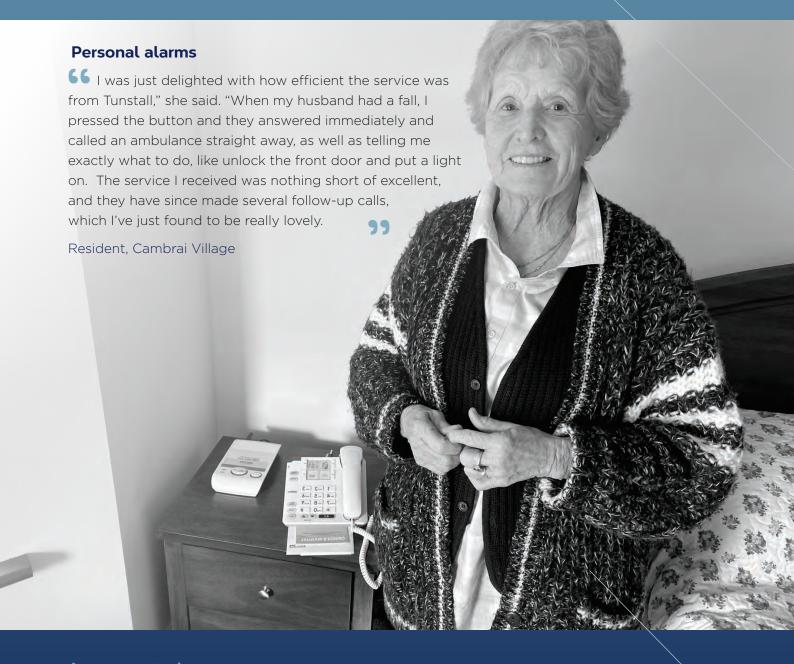
### Information and Records Management System
